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
RECYCLING MARKETS REPORT

Recently I've been reading salvos in a raging debate about biological and ecological conservation. Traditionally, conservation has largely been about protecting "natural" environments by keeping human presence to a minimum. Now some observers have pointed out that there are no longer any environments untouched by human activity (especially if you include the effects of carbon dioxide and plastic pollutants); "pristine" is a moving target; and the approach as a whole is elitist (for example, see here).

But the biggest critique of traditional land conservation and species preservation efforts is that, on a global scale, they are failing. In short: "Biodiversity on Earth continues its rapid decline. We continue to lose forests in Africa, Asia, and Latin America. There are so few wild tigers and apes that they will be lost forever if current trends continue. Simply put, we are losing many more special places and species than we're saving.

If you follow economic trends in the solid waste industry, as well as related public policy, you know that New York City's waste management decisions have affected the bottom lines of a number of industry players, prompted defensive legislation in surrounding states and presented challenges to more than one well-meaning politician.

In February, the Citizens Budget Commission of New York (CBC) released the fourth in its recent series of reports, which focus on the staggering \$1.5 billion annual sanitation budget and far-reaching impact of New York City's current solid waste management system. The CBC is a nonprofit watchdog group that studies the financial and management practices of New York City and the state of New York.

4 Tips for Creating a Better Waste Management Plan

Recycling and waste management should be implemented as a resource management system, not a waste management system. As recycling programs began to be implemented in the 1970s and 1980s they were thought of as part of the solid waste collection system. Recycling programs were expected to cover their costs in a manner similar to waste collection programs: through user fees or local taxes. This often resulted in recycling program costs and revenues incorporated into the overall waste collection system, even when the increase in recycling resulted in a reduction in overall system costs, especially where disposal costs were high. Today the approach that is considered a "best practice" is to view recyclables as commodities that are managed under a resource management system consistent with management frameworks such as "sustainable materials management" and "zero waste".
